On Thursday, May 12, at 10:00 a.m. in room 253 of the Russell Senate Office Building, the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation will hold a hearing titled, "Economic Ramifications of Cyber Threats and Vulnerabilities to the Private Sector." As Chairman of the Committee, I invite you to testify.

At this hearing, the Committee will consider the impact of cybercrime on the national and economic security of the United States and efforts by the private sector to defend against skilled cyber attackers. As a cybersecurity expert with experience in organizational operational risk, we ask that your testimony describe emerging cyber threats to United States businesses and the impact of those threats on U.S. national and economic security; how organizations measure and mitigate information security risk; corporate reporting requirements to the Securities and Exchange Commission and the impact of corporate reporting on the financial market (including credit rating agencies and securities analysts); and actions that might be taken to correct market inefficiencies. Please include any other relevant items you wish to bring to the attention of the Committee

While your full statement will be made part of the record, we ask that, in your oral testimony, you limit your remarks to five minutes, highlighting or summarizing the most important points. Enclosed is a copy of the Rules of Procedure for witnesses testifying before the Commerce Committee. Please read and follow these rules carefully.
